# Re-entry Passes

Each property owner with proof of residency (current utility bill with NTB address/tax bill) and picture ID receives TWO re-entry passes.

The passes will be re-issued on a 3 year cycle.

Property owners SOUTH of Town Hall will need to obtain a new pass in 2012, this includes Ocean City. Please return the old passes to Town Hall. The passes for South of Town Hall will be red this year and expire in 2015. Lost passes can be replaced with proof of residency, ID, and \$10 for each pass replaced.

When Can You Get a Pass? Passes are available now. The Town encourages everyone to get their passes as early as possible, preferably before hurricane season begins (June 1st). If the storm is on its way, it's too late to get a pass. The Town will not issue passes within 72 hours of predicted landfall. Passes are issued at Town Hall Monday through Friday between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. After an event the Town will either have an inland station set up to issue passes to property owners (with proof of residency and ID) or those documents will be accepted at the barricade. Please keep in mind that this will slow down the reentry process and obtaining a re-entry pass before hurricane season begins is highly recommended.

The Town also accepts requests through the mail. Send a copy of a current utility bill (with NTB address), a signed and notarized Re-Entry Pass Application (attached), a self-addressed stamped envelope and the old passes to:

# NTB's Sea Oat Program

NTB's sea oats program will start in April or May; 200 sea oats cost the property owner \$50, and \$100 for 400 plants. Check the NTB website they will post when the sales begins <a href="https://www.ntbnc.org">www.ntbnc.org</a>. Please team up with your neighbors; these are excellent plants to stop erosion.

Sea oats (Uniola paniculata) play a major role in stabilizing and building dunes. It will take about 64 seedlings to plant an area of dune that is  $10^{\circ} \times 10^{\circ}$  in area. Best planting times are between April and May. If people walk over the young plants, the plants' survival will be greatly reduced.

### Steps for planting:

- 1. Select the area to be planted and rope off three sides (along the top of the dune and down two sides, leaving the beach front accessible).
- 2. Run a tape measure along the top edge of the dune and mark off a point every 18". This can be done by using spray paint, sticks or other markers.
- 3. Use shovels or other digging tools to dig a hole 8-12" deep at each marked point. Holes need only be a few inches in diameter.
- 4. Place one sea oat seedling in each hole, making sure that the top of the root ball is at least 4" below the surface of the sand. Fill in the hole around the seedling with sand.
- 5. Sprinkle one teaspoon of time-release fertilizer around the base of each plant. Work the fertilizer into the sand with the spoon or your fingers.
- 6. Repeat steps 2-5 for additional rows of sea oats, making sure that each row is staggered and 18" apart. This can be accomplished using the long tape measure or by giving each person an 18" long piece of wood or flagging tape so that they can measure 18" from the newly planted sea oats. Do not plant sea oats below the high tide mark as the plants will get washed away.
- 7. Plants should be watered immediately following planting, then again weekly for the first few months.

The Transportation Planning Branch of the North Carolina Department of Transportation, in cooperation with the local municipal governments in the Topsail Area, the Cape Fear RPO and the Down East RPO has developed a comprehensive transportation plan (CTP) for the area. A CTP Team consisting of representatives from the above groups was formed to guide and direct the development of the CTP.

The transportation plan is a long-range plan that identifies major transportation improvements that will be needed over the next 30 years. Major milestones in the development of the plan included the completion of a Goal and Objectives Survey, consensus on capacity deficiency analysis and continued coordination between the military, NCDOT and local government officials on recommendations.

The CTP has been adopted by each local government and endorsed by the Cape Fear and Down East Rural Planning Organization. The North Carolina Board of Transportation adopted the Topsail Area Comprehensive Transportation Plan. ### Paving of Highway 210

The State DOT will be opening bids in this month for the sub grade work and paving of HWY 210 from the Pender and Onslow Co. line to the NTB Bridge. The surfacing will be from edge of pavement. Paving is set to begin in March and will hopefully be completed by Labor Day. The State indicated that they would do everything possible to keep traffic issues at a minimum.

#### Gravel Parking Added @ Green and Chestnut Streets



NTB has added gravel from the resident's property line to the street for beach access parking on Green and Chestnut streets. Both sides of the road were done on Chestnut Street and only one side on Green Street.

### Solid Waste Billing

Solid waste billing method has changed beginning in September; solid waste fees will be billed through ONWASA (residents were previously billed on their Onslow County tax bill). Customers who are not individually billed from water have been billed by the Town.

#### Dunes

NTB will not be conducting a push of the dunes this year, however if you are interested in pushing your dune we have the name of an individual who can do the push, price per cubic yard and the number of cubic yards per property owner.

# Beach Nourishment

The Town is seeking more information in order to proceed with to Proceed with Phase One of the Shoreline Protection Project. Town Staff has reported that storms and the effects of northeastern winds have caused erosion on the North end of the Town. There are 6 to 8 homes that are currently threatened. The Topsail Reef condominium complex is planning on sandbagging all eight of their buildings and some individual property owners are considering sandbagging as well, as this is the only immediate measure that can be taken to protect property.

At the January 4, 2012 regular Board of Aldermen meeting, the Board of Aldermen made the decision to proceed with Phase One of the Shoreline Protection Project (more info, also see Project 2 on this page) and to have Coastal Planning & Engineering (CP&E), which developed the project, review with potential contractors possible changes in the plan that would lead to cost savings in construction and implementation and to report back to the Board with their findings. Phase One of the proposed projects will realign and deepen New River Inlet. The sand from the channel deepening will be used to nourish the northern end of the island.

The Board also agreed that after review and consent by the Board of the findings, the Town will proceed with directing CP&E to prepare the necessary design, engineering, and bid documents in order to begin construction as soon as practicable in 2012. The Board also agreed that it will schedule a workshop to review available funding sources and to develop a final plan for implementation. In addition, the Board agreed to suspend the Town's permit application fee to move a house through the calendar year of 2012, provided the house remains in North Topsail Beach

# Preventing Wind Erosion with Sand Fencing

Across open bare, sandy soil areas subject to frequent winds, where the trapping of blowing sand is desired. Wind fences are used primarily to build frontal ocean dunes (to control erosion from wave over wash and flooding).

#### Definition:

An artificial barrier of evenly spaced wooden slats or synthetic fabric erected perpendicular to the prevailing wind and supported by posts. Sand fences are usually made commercially of light wooden slats wired together with spaces between the slats. The distance between slats is approximately equal to the slat width (about 1 1/2 inches). Synthetic fencing fabric is available for this use. The fences are erected 2 to 4 feet high in parallel rows spaced 30 to 40 feet apart over the area to be protected. Fences are supported by wooden or metal posts.

### Purpose

To reduce wind velocity at the ground surface and trap blowing sand. Typically used for rebuilding frontal dunes along coastal areas.

Where Practice Applies Planning Considerations

When wind fences are approximately two-thirds full, another series of fences is erected. In this manner, dunes can be built 2 to 6 feet high or more during a single season. When the dune has reached the approximate height of other mature dunes or when the building process slows significantly, stabilize with appropriate vegetation Install sand fences in spring or early summer and seed selected permanent vegetation in the fall or the following spring. Erect a windward fence parallel to existing dune (generally perpendicular to the prevailing onshore wind), at least one foot above the maximum annual high water elevation. Locate a second fence generally parallel to the first at the top edge of the eroded dune bank. Space additional parallel fences 30 -40 feet apart as

Sand fence has evolved over the years to be one of the predominate trappers of sand from wind-blown erosion. If sand fence is installed on your property specific goals should drive the placement of the fence. If you are only interested in sand trapping and dune building placement the sand fence should maximize sand drop in the desired

area. Generally this is going to be about 10 down from the crest of the dune. This will place sand in an area from the toe of the fence back to within 3 to 4 feet of the crest. This will start building the face of the dune and moving the dune seaward building maximum height and depth.

If your needs require movement of the toe of the frontal dune in order to establish vegetation and a frontal vegetation line for CAMA permitting then placement of the sand fence should be as close to the seaward toe of the frontal dune as needed or allowed by CAMA rules and regulations. The maximum allowed for this type of installation is 10 feet from the toe of the existing dune. A lot of factors including lunar tides affect this so placement in this area of the beach requires some thought and expertise. This placement only works in conjunction with heavy planting and should not be considered without a thorough dune management plan in place.

#### Sand fence basics :

Fence sections should be no longer than 10 feet. Fence should be placed at a 45 to 90 degree angle to beach. Back post of fence should be placed into predominate wind.

### No Permit is needed if you adhere to the following criteria:

Sand fences that are installed and maintained subject to the following criteria are exempt from the permit requirements of the

Coastal Area Management Act:

- (1) Sand fencing may only be installed for the purpose of: building sand dunes by trapping wind blown sand; the protection of the dune(s) and vegetation (planted or existing).
- (2) Sand fencing shall not impede existing public access to the beach, recreational use of the beach or emergency vehicle access. Sand fencing shall not be installed in a manner that impedes or restricts established common law and statutory rights of public access and use of public trust lands and waters.
- (3) Sand fencing shall not be installed in a manner that impedes, traps or otherwise endangers sea turtles, sea turtle nests or sea turtle hatchlings.
- (4) Non-functioning, damaged, or unsecured, sand fencing shall be immediately removed by the property owner.
- (5) Sand fencing shall be constructed from evenly spaced thin wooden vertical slats connected with twisted wire, no more than 5 feet in height. Wooden posts or stakes no larger than 2" X 4" or 3" diameter shall support sand fencing.
- (6) Location. Sand fencing shall be placed as far landward as possible to avoid interference with sea turtle nesting, existing public access, recreational use of the beach, and emergency vehicle access.
  - (a) Sand fencing shall not be placed on the wet sand beach area.
  - (b) Sand fencing installed parallel to the shoreline shall be located no farther water-ward than the crest of the frontal or primary dune; or
  - (c) Sand fencing installed water-ward of the crest of the frontal or primary dune shall be installed at an angle no less than 45 degrees to the shoreline. Individual sections of sand fence shall not exceed more than 10 feet in length (except for public access-ways) and shall be spaced no less than seven feet apart, and shall not extend more than 10 feet water-ward of the following locations, whichever is most water-ward, as defined in 15A NCAC 7H .0305: the first line of stable natural vegetation, the toe of the frontal or primary dune, or erosion escarpment of frontal or primary dune; and (d) Sand fencing along public access-ways may equal the length of the access-way, and may include a 45 degree funnel on the water-ward end. The water-ward location of the funnel shall not exceed 10 feet water-ward of the locations identified in Item (6)(c) of this Rule.

# Did You Know?

All electrical work on rental property must be performed by a NC licensed electrician.

All window and door replacement requires a building permit regardless of cost; these elements are considered structural components of the building.

Installation of driveways also requires a permit.

ALL work exceeding \$5,000.00 in cost must be permitted; this includes siding, roofing and deck repairs.

The repair or replacement of any load bearing members requires a permit as well as sheathing replacement designed for uplift.

The addition or change in any plumbing lines and heating and cooling systems also require permits.

All personnel doing work in North Topsail beach are required to have a Privilege License issued by the Town.
